All I want for Christmas... is my Dad to come home for my birthday in May, and my brother to come back safe to spend "guy time" with me in the garage. Those are the wishes of two sixth graders at San Onofre School. Victoria (Tori) Sego and David Garlipp sat down with me in front of an oversized map of the world and talked frankly about their thoughts and fears about being a military child while having a loved one deployed to Afghanistan. Their blue eyes shined and twinkled with emotion when expressing what they missed the most about their deployed father and brother. However, they became almost apologetic when a glimpse of self-pity came up in their speech. They were mature beyond their years; their resilience, sense of pride and understanding of the situation at hand was honorable. As children of Marines serving in a war torn country, both children spoke of a feeling of being left behind. Yet it was evident that they had developed an incredible stoicism that rivaled their military loved ones. I sat humbly in front of these children, purely listening to their upbeat account of being a military child. A sense of respect and admiration came pouring down into my mundane Friday morning. Their positive attitude, deeply-felt patriotism and sense of pride for being connected to the military were inspiring. Below are their thoughts and wishes for this Holiday season:

S.L. What are some of the benefits of being a military child? And the worst

T.S. Go to different places. Get discounts on amusement parks.

Talk to friends about common things such as parents ranks and deployments. **Worst:** My dad deploying a lot and missing our birthdays.

D.G. To be able to see military "things" and be involved in Young Marines.

Worst: My brother being deployed and training for long periods of time.

S.L. What has been your favorite place to live and what do you like the best about Camp Pendleton?

T.S. I loved 29 Palms. Always warm and people were very nice there. What I like the most at CPen is the beach and that I have lots of friends.

D.G. I like CPen a lot because it has lots of beaches, sandbars and a surf camps.

S.L. What do you miss the most about your deployed father/brother?

T.S. Hanging out with him because he jokes a lot and he spoils me. Him helping my mom with my brothers so that she has more time to spend with me and take me to soccer. I

have to take rides from my coach now. But I am used to it. **D.G.** I miss "guy time" in the garage fixing our dirt bikes and cars.

S.L. Who do you talk to when you get worried about your father/brother? **T.S.** I talk to my best friend Maddie because I've known her for a long time and she understands what I am talking about. I also talk to my Mom.

D.G. I talk to my sister, because I get worried when he goes on missions. But my sister says he has been deployed many times and nothing has happened before so he will be fine this time too.

S.L. What are your wishes for the upcoming Christmas season?

T.S. Wish for Dad to come back home for my birthday and be able to visit family in Washington.

D.G. I wish my brother comes home for Christmas to be here when my sister has her baby and maybe get another dirt bike.

This fall 332 teenagers from El Camino, Ocean Shores, Oceanside and Fallbrook Union high schools have participated in the Base's career awareness program. - Provide children with a normal, predictable routine.
- Children need the opportunity to ask questions and express their feelings when they feel confused and uncertain.
- Give direct, simple answers.
- Be a good listener but don't dwell.
- Children will often respond the same way adults respond to a situation-model calm, controlled behavior.
- Remember the value of laughter and fun
- Extensive television viewing is discouraged, especially for younger children.
