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Camp COPE, "Secret" of the Golden Apple By Maria Swanson

On a cold, rainy Saturday morning, children and their parents reported to San Onofre School. Unusual sight as most children would have preferred to still have been sleeping. However, today was no ordinary Saturday, Camp COPE staff and volunteers took over the school and created an inviting, intriguing and welcoming place to be. On October 16, eighty six children and twenty two participating parents were the benefactors of the altruistic vision of the Camp COPE founder Elizabeth Reep and co-founder Sarah Bravo. Camp COPE philosophy rests on the quest to help children of wounded, deployed and fallen service members cope with the effects of war and the sacrifices they are asked to make every day. The Camp organizers strive to make their services available to children of all service members, and it is provided at absolutely no cost to the children, their families

and the host military installation. The idea to create Camp COPE came from the personal experience of Ms. Reep, an Army wife. Her husband, lost an eye and two fingers after a rocket-propelled grenade exploded next to him in Iraq November 2003.Ms. Reep, a social worker, saw her stepsons, struggle with seeing their father wounded and trying to cope with the aftermath of his injuries, and decided to create a one day Camp for military children undergoing wartime stress. Together with her friend Sarah Bravo, they named their venture Camp COPE, which stands for: Courage to

accept the change; Optimism that things will get better; Patience that it will take time; Encouragement that you need and how to give it. The Camp provides Licensed, insured and trained counselors to teach curriculum and lead groups. At San Onofre school, children learned coping skills in a fun, active format, and a parenting support class and relationship enrichment class was offered to parents whose kids/teens attended Camp COPE. The benefits of this program could genuinely be seen in the faces and reactions of those who participated.
